Welcome

Let's all *Unite Against Poverty!* There is no time like 2025! This year is an exciting time in the life of the church.

A Jubilee year only comes around once every quarter of a century, and it brings with it a special invitation for each one of us. That invitation is close to the heart of Caritas Australia's Project Compassion. The theme of Jubilee 2025 is Pilgrims of Hope. It is hope which calls us to come together and Unite Against Poverty.

The idea of a jubilee goes right back to biblical times and is closely linked to our call to a faith that does justice. It stems from the idea of a Sabbath. Once a week, from the beginning of our relationship with God, we stopped work to rest. Every seven years, at least part of the land was allowed to rest and recover, something that modern science happens to appreciate as part of caring for Earth. During a jubilee year, all the land was allowed to lie fallow and debts were called off. It was seen as a fresh start. The word jubilee shares its origin with our word jubilation.

In Chapter 4 of Luke's Gospel, when Jesus returns to his hometown, he announces the 'year of the Lord's favor.' This is the meaning of jubilee: 'he has sent me to bring good news to the poor and freedom for those in captivity'.

Inaugurating the Holy Year, Pope Francis wrote:

We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision... This will indeed be the case if we are capable of recovering a sense of universal fraternity and refuse to turn a blind eye to the tragedy of rampant poverty that prevents millions of men, women, young people and children from living in a manner worthy of our human dignity.

During Lent, we are called to be good news for the poor. Project Compassion is a wonderful way to do this. This year, as always, we will be sharing several stories. They represent just a fraction of the work you support through Project Compassion. We will meet Toefuata'iga in Samoa, Lam



from rural Vietnam, and Irene from the Democratic Republic of the Congo. I am sure you will find them challenging and inspiring.

Caritas Australia reminds us of our Christian vocation to Unite Against Poverty. Pope Francis has spoken about the culture of indifference. We are so very grateful that our Catholic community is far from indifferent to our sisters and brothers around the world. Even with the rising cost of living and other pressures, Catholics in Australia are so generous. For this we are deeply thankful.

On the night before he died, Jesus prayed 'may they all be one.' (John 17:21). Let us come together once again in this Year of Jubilee and *Unite Against Poverty!*

CHECKLIST

- SHARE the Project Compassion resources with your colleagues, by sending the links to key resources
- SELECT students and teachers who will help drive Project Compassion. They might be class representatives, school leaders or your social justice group.

- PLAN your school's Ash Wednesday Liturgy. Resource are available at <u>caritas.org.au/project-compassion</u>
- **REGISTER for online fundraising** and plan a <u>Big Water Walk or other</u> engaging fundraising activities. See the <u>Fundraising Booklet</u> for more ideas.
- REGISTER your class for live Caritas Q&A sessions at caritas.org.au/project-compassion/caritas-q-a/ These are live Q&A sessions with Caritas staff and partners. Sessions are available for Y4-6 and Y7-12.
- □ **DISTRIBUTE individual or class boxes.** If possible, offer these to students and teachers individually, either as people leave the Ash Wednesday Mass or after Communion, signifying the link between saying 'Amen' to the Body of Christ and 'being' the Body of Christ in the world today.
- WATCH films before showing students to ensure they are suitable for your audience. We have suggested audiences listed below. Project Compassion Introduction Film 'Day in the Life' films for primary schools: Samoa, Vietnam and DRC Story films Toefuata'iga (upper primary and secondary), Lam (upper primary and secondary) and Irene (secondary only))
 Note: The films are subtitled for students with hearing impairments.
- **DISPLAY posters** prominently in your school reception, other meeting rooms and classrooms.
- MEET with your student/teacher organisers to plan a 'whole school' approach to raising awareness and fundraising during Project Compassion this year.


- **SHARE stories.** Insert the Project Compassion <u>School Newsletter Notice</u> in your weekly school newsletters.

HOLY WEEK

■ USE the 'Way of the Cross' resource (Primary or Secondary), which comes with leader's notes, as a prayer and reflection activity for the whole school.

AFTER EASTER

- □ **THANK the school community.** Turn over your Project Compassion poster to display the 'Thank You' poster on the back and place a Thank You notice in your school newsletter and on social media. Encouraging families to return all donations as soon as possible.
- **FORWARD your donations** and Record of Receipts sheet to Caritas Australia before 31 May 2025.
- □ **SHARE your fundraising total** with your school community and thank them once again.

May our compassionate minds and generous hearts help bring about a world where all can live in peace.



Catholic Social Teaching (CST) Guide

Catholic Social Teaching (CST) principles cover all spheres of life – the economic, political, ecological, personal and spiritual. The principles are inspired by scripture and the writings of the Pope and other Catholic leaders about social issues.

Caritas Australia's work is shaped by the tradition of Catholic Social Teaching.

HUMAN DIGNITY

We believe every human being is created in the image and likeness of God and therefore has inherent dignity that should always be safeguarded.



SUBSIDIARITY AND PARTICIPATION

We believe all people have the right to participate in decisions that affect their lives. Subsidiarity requires that decisions are made by people closest and most affected by the issues and concerns of the community.





SOLIDARITY

We believe we are part of one human family and have a responsibility to help each person achieve their full potential.



THE COMMON GOOD

We believe the good of each human person is intimately related to the good of the whole community. We are all responsible for each other.



We believe in prioritising the women, men and children most vulnerable to extreme poverty and injustice.



CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

We believe that care for our common home is vital for the common good of all people. We believe a true ecological approach is a social approach. We are to be protectors of creation and of one another.

Fundraising for social justice

Caritas Australia believes that fundraising should be FUN! It's also an opportunity to raise awareness about important issues, and a chance for the community to take part in a social justice action. Everyone who contributes is empowered and able to stand in solidarity with the communities we serve and those who benefit from our actions.

STEP 1: ACT CHARITABLY

Donate to Project Compassion and inspire others to help you fundraise too. You'll help support long-term programs that help communities lift themselves out of poverty, and support emergency relief programs around the world.

<u>Suggested action:</u> set-up your own online fundraising page and share your URL with others or collect funds using your Project Compassion donation box. Funds collected go to long-term integral human development programs and emergency relief programs.

STEP 3: ACT IN SOLIDARITY

Actions like walking a long way – in solidarity with those who walk a long way to collect water, or those fleeing conflict zones to safety, promote empathy and understanding. When you walk in the shoes of the world's most vulnerable, you start to understand, with compassion, the injustices these communities face.

<u>Suggested action:</u> Complete The Big Water Walk in solidarity with the millions of people who walk every day to access clean water.

STEP 2: RAISE AWARENESS

Help others understand the issues that people experiencing extreme poverty are faced with. Inform your community about how their donations can help communities gain access to clean water, food security, basic healthcare and safety.

<u>Suggested actions:</u> Show the Project Compassion films, display printed materials around your school and include notices in your school newsletter. Share information on social media.

STEP 4: ACT FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE

Take social justice actions to address underlying issues and make a global impact. Using the knowledge and tools you have learnt through Project Compassion, raise your voice and push for lasting change, helping to create a more just and sustainable world.

<u>Suggested action:</u> Take action for social justice by supporting climate justice. Many of our partners are experiencing the harsh impacts of climate change.



Student Action Planner

PLANNING GROUP MEMBERS:

1. THINK – What is the focus of your campaign? Why is this issue important?

2. LEARN — What facts and figures do you need? Where can you get this information? Make it real with an example of a Caritas Australia community development program.

3. TOOLS — For example, setting up a Project Compassion online fundraising page, social media, posters, stalls, newsletter items, slides from the Caritas Australia website, music, an event or assembly presentation, etc.

4. CONTACTS AND PERMISSIONS — Make an appointment to see your Principal to talk about what you have learnt and how you would like to engage the rest of the school community. Who else do you need to speak to? (E.g. teachers, parish priest, participants, others)

Have a chat with your school media person as they might have some good contacts with local newspapers. Get your justice agenda out into your wider community! Share the good news!

5. SET A DATE

When will your main event take place? When will you start preparations? When do you need to start promotion?

JUSTICE BEGINS WITH ME! — What personal action will each member of your group take? How will you lead by example?

REFLECT ON FAITH AND ACTION — What Catholic Social Teaching principles guide you to take action for people who experience poverty?


